Former Chief Justice's Inspiring Lectures at SCE

ormer Chief Justice Lyonpo Sonam Tobgye honours Samtse College of Education with enlightening guest lectures from March 14th to 16th, 2024. Over three captivating days, His Excellency gave the audience profound insights into Bhutan's monarchy, culture, and constitution. The enriching lectures, spanning half a day for each of the three days, attracted distinguished attendees including Dasho Drangpon of Samtse District Court, esteemed faculty and staff, select guests, and students, all gathered in the College Auditorium.

The programme kicked off on March 14th with the traditional Marchang ceremony, followed by a warm welcome address from the College President. His Excellency commenced the series by elucidating the intricate history of monarchy in Bhutan based on philosophies and history. He highlighted that monarchy offers a unique sense of security, distinct from any elected political party, owing to its steadfast long-term vision.

Continuing the discourse on March 15th, His Excellency delved into an extensive exploration of the defining characteristics of Bhutanese culture and etiquette, elucidating profound insights into the nation's ethos structured around three fundamental attributes: Appearance, Attitude, and Actions. Supplementing theoretical discourse with practical demonstrations, the lecture comprehensively understood these fundamental attributes. The culmination of the lecture series on March 16th saw a deep dive into the Constitution of the Kingdom of Bhutan and the evolution of its democratic institutions. Each session was punctuated with an interactive question-and-answer segment, fostering dialogue and intellectual exchange.

Reflecting on the enlightening experience, Pem Dorji, a student pursuing a Bachelor of Arts in Social Work, expressed gratitude for the enriching insights gained during the programme, emphasising the invaluable contribution of this knowledge to his future endeavours as a social worker. His Excellency left an enduring legacy of inspiration derived from both his personal experiences and the scholarly discourse imparted through his lectures.

Over the course of two days, participants were immersed in foundational principles of news writing, including various news types, journalism ethics, and strategies for crafting engaging headlines. Additionally, the workshop addressed topics such as sentence structure and essential rules for news writing, with practical examples provided for clarity.

Feedback from participants highlighted the workshop's positive impact. Karma Dechen, a student from B.Ed English and Geography, emphasised its role in improving the quality of the college's news publications and enhancing students' writing skills, which are beneficial

not only for current endeavours but also for future journalistic pursuits. Reshma Rai from B.Ed English and Geography also echoed these sentiments, noting a noticeable improvement in her writing proficiency due to the workshop's focused approach, despite its brief duration. She suggested the continuation of similar workshops to benefit a wider student audience.

Twenty students, comprising fifteen girls and five boys, participated in the workshop. With their newfound knowledge, these students are prepared to contribute effectively to the college newsletter team, reporting on institutional news and fostering informed discussion within the college community.



Induction Programme for the New Faculty Members of the Colleges of RUB

The induction programme for the 23 new faculty members of the Royal University of Bhutan took place at Samtse College of Education from December 25th to December 31st, 2023. Seven faculty members from Samtse College of Education facilitated the programme. Participants were from the College of Science and Technology (CST), Jigme Namgyal Engineering College, College of Natural Resources, and Sherubtse College. The overarching aim of the programme was to equip participants with essential knowledge and skills. Specific objectives included exploring pedagogical approaches for student-centered learning, assessing students' progress using diverse methodologies, optimising learning outcomes through effective pedagogical strategies, emphasising academic integrity, and understanding RUB's academic regulations.

The programme covered a wide range of topics including delivering effective lectures, understanding learning dynamics, exploring learning domains, facilitating group activities, utilising teaching resources, implementing the Flipped Classroom model, understanding Universal Design for Learning (UDL), questioning techniques, assessment principles, leveraging educational technology, lesson planning, RUB's academic regulations, and

promoting academic integrity. Various instructional methods such as presentations, individual/group activities, discussions, and hands-on sessions were employed.

Each session incorporated both theoretical insights and practical applications, and technological tools allowing participants to engage critically with the content and apply their learning to their teaching contexts. Throughout the sessions, participants exhibited high levels of involvement and enthusiasm, actively contributing to discussions, sharing personal insights, and seeking strategies to refine their pedagogical approaches.

Participant feedback revealed their acquisition of competencies necessary to enhance the student-centricity and interactivity of their teaching sessions by integrating technology and diverse strategies. Notably, therewere no recommendations for future induction programmes made, expressing satisfaction with the comprehensive coverage of essential topics and the meaningfulness of their learning experience.

three-day capacity building workshop for the faculty of JSW Law was organised by the CULT unit at Samtse College of Education. The workshop was held at Samtse College of Education from 24th to 26th January 2024. It was facilitated by three faculty members of Samtse College of Education. A total of 12 faculty members from JSW Law participated in this workshop.

The workshop aimed to enable the participants to acquire knowledge and skills on:

- application of the domains of adolescent development in instructional designs, studentteacher relationships, and addressing student issues;
- major philosophies of education;
- models of curriculum development;
- various assessment strategies and techniques to enhance student learning and achievement; and
- principles of effective feedback.

Methodologically, the workshop employed a combination of instructional methods, including presentations, group discussions, and hands-on

activities, fostering collaboration and knowledge sharing among participants. Participant engagement was a key aspect of the workshop, with the participants actively contributing to discussions, sharing their experiences, and reflecting on their teaching practices.

Feedback from participants indicated high levels of satisfaction with the workshop content, facilitation, and relevance to their professional development needs. Participants expressed appreciation for the opportunity to learn about the different types of curriculum, the psychology of adolescents, and the different types of assessments. The feedback also showed that the facilitators were knowledgeable, resourceful, and well-prepared.

Training of Trainers Programme on Integrating Technology into Higher Education Instructional Practices

he Centre for University Learning and Teaching (CULT) at Samtse College of Education (SCE) organised a Training of Trainers (ToT) programme titled "Integrating Technology into Higher Education Instructional Practices." Held at the College of Science and Technology (CST) from April 8th to 10th, 2024, the programme brought together ten participants representing five constituent colleges of the Royal University of Bhutan. This three-day programme aimed to equip participants with the pedagogical skills and technological proficiency necessary to integrate technology effectively into their teaching practices. The focus was on fostering a technologyenriched learning environment that promotes deeper student engagement and improved learning outcomes.

The ToT programme employed a multifaceted approach, combining theoretical frameworks with practical applications. Day One explored active learning strategies through multimedia creation tools like H5P for interactive presentations and videos. Participants also delved into e-portfolio development and the integration of synchronous discussions into their courses. Collaborative tools like Padlet, Mentimeter, and Ideaboardz were introduced to promote student engagement through active participation in discussions, simulations, and co-creation activities.

Day Two transitioned to blended learning strategies, investigating platforms like Screen Pal and Loom for effective video lesson creation. Self-paced learning platforms were explored for designing quizzes with diverse question types and clear instructions. The programme emphasised the importance of formative assessment through automated feedback tools like Nearpod and feedback bars, enabling educators to

create interactive lessons that provide students with immediate and targeted feedback, fostering deeper understanding and improved performance.

Day Three delved into immersive learning. Participants explored the potential of virtual labs and simulations, finding PhET tools particularly valuable for enhancing their teaching. Participants also explored the field of Artificial Intelligence (AI) through engagement with Generative AI. They debated its merits and assessed its capabilities for content generation. Finally, the sessions focused on leveraging Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) features such as OU Blog for collaborative class blogs, reusing learning activities, and incorporating multimedia content within the platform.

The programme adopted a dynamic and participatory approach. Participants actively engaged in hands-on workshops utilising a variety of interactive tools encompassing polls, quizzes, surveys, video creation and editing platforms, multimedia presentations, visual analysis tools, blogs, and Google Sites. This comprehensive approach aimed to equip educators with the necessary skills to create engaging and effective learning environments catering to diverse student needs.

The programme concluded with positive feedback from participants, highlighting their to further develop their skills in cutting-edge

educational technologies. Specific areas of interest included the integration of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in teaching, the utilisation of Google Cloud and Workspace tools, and the exploration of technology's potential to promote critical thinking and foster innovation in the classroom. Additionally, participants expressed a keen interest in advanced VLE features and refining their video production and simulation technique skills.

Overall, the ToT programme provided a valuable platform for faculty development, fostering a community of educators equipped to integrate technology effectively and create dynamic learning experiences for their students.

SCE Lecturer Awarded Murdoch University Trongsa Penlop PhD Scholarship

r. Tshering Dorji, a lecturer in the Department of Arts and Humanities Education at Samtse College of Education, Royal University of Bhutan (RUB), has been awarded the inaugural Murdoch University Trongsa Penlop PhD Scholarship. The award ceremony, held on 6th July 2024 in Thimphu, was graced by Her Excellency Sherig Lyonpo, Dasho Vice Chancellor of RUB, the Hon'ble Pro Vice-Chancellor International at Murdoch University, Australia, and other dignitaries. Selected from a competitive pool of 70 candidates, Tshering will pursue his doctoral studies at Murdoch University's School of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences (HASS) in Australia. His research will focus on the implementation of Bhutan's national youth policy, specifically analysing stakeholder partnerships and challenges.

The scholarship, established through collaboration between Murdoch University and Bhutan, aims

to support exceptional Bhutanese scholars in conducting PhD research relevant to the nation's development. Upon receiving the award, Tshering expressed, "As I receive this award, I pledge and commit to upholding the values of academic excellence, integrity, and perseverance in the field of research and contributing to our nation through research projects" (cited in Bhutan Times, 14th July). Tshering Dorji's research project will concentrate on the implementation of Bhutan's national youth policy, focusing on stakeholder partnerships and challenges. Under the guidance of the Indo-Pacific Research Centre (IPRC) at Murdoch University, he will apply an ecosystems theory framework to evaluate current policy implementation practices.

Professor Kelly Smith, Pro Vice-Chancellor International at Murdoch University, expressed his pleasure at Tshering's achievement and emphasised the significance of the scholarship and its potential to foster further collaboration between the institutions. Smith reiterated Murdoch University's dedication to supporting Bhutan's development goals by nurturing exceptional academic talent and expanding research partnerships with Bhutanese institutions to enhance academic capacity in various fields (cited in Bhutan Times, 14th July).

College Organised Workshop on Educational Statistics

he College conducted a highly successful workshop on Educational Statistics from March 21 to March 23, 2024, attended by all faculty members. The primary goal of the workshop was to enhance faculty capabilities in applying educational statistics and other scholarly methodologies in their academic work.

The training was led by Associate Professor Dr. Kezang Sherab, Dean of Research and Industrial Linkages at Paro College of Education, Paro. Dr. Kezang, known for his extensive experience and expertise, provided a comprehensive and enriching learning experience for all participants. To facilitate full participation, all classes and co-curricular activities were suspended, and students engaged in Choshey layrim during the workshop days.

Faculty members were encouraged to actively participate and capitalise on this valuable learning opportunity, with the administration emphasising that their engagement would significantly contribute to the collective knowledge and academic endeavours of the College.

Dr. Yangdon, one of participants praised the workshop, stating, "The workshop was very well

organised both in terms of content and logistics. The resource person was very knowledgeable in this area, and the way he approached his session was very simple and understandable. Though I used to find statistics difficult, through this workshop I kind of developed an interest in quantitative studies." Similarly, Dr. Sonam Daker expressed that, "This was a very productive workshop for me. I only wish this was offered much earlier. Doing this would have encouraged many of us to carry out quantitative research with much ease and confidence. Nevertheless, better late than never – I hope my young colleagues now confidently venture into research with SPSS."

The workshop covered all aspects of educational statistics, including both descriptive and inferential statistics, and featured hands-on exercises. The comprehensive coverage of topics ensured that participants left with a thorough understanding of statistical concepts and their applications in educational research.

Dr. Sonam Rinchen, coordinator of the workshop expressed that overall, the workshop was well received by all participants, who expressed high satisfaction with both the content and the organisation. The faculty members left the workshop feeling more confident and equipped to undertake quantitative research, marking a significant step forward in the College's commitment to fostering a robust research culture.

n May 21, 2024, Dean, Research and Industrial Linkage's office hosted a webinar on "Understanding Action Research (AR) in the context of Bhutanese culture," attended by the Postgraduate Diploma in Education (PgDE) students from Samtse College of Education (SCE), college lecturers, and field teachers. The webinar aimed to enhance the AR skills of PgDE students studying the action research module as part of their programme and to improve the research capacity of school teachers required to conduct AR for professional growth. Dr. Tshewang Rabgay, a researcher and teaching associate at Monash University and an alumnus of SCE, led the session. Dr. Rabgay, who has experience as a science teacher in Bhutan and a researcher for the Royal Research and Advisory Council (RRAC), shared his expertise.

Tshering Dema, a PgDE II A student, found the webinar enriching and emotionally engaging. She was fascinated by the application of AR within Bhutan's unique social and cultural framework

and impressed by Dr. Rabgay's blend of anecdotes, research findings, and practical applications. She reflected on the connection between AR and Bhutan's Gross National Happiness philosophy, emphasising the importance of integrating local values and perspectives into academic pursuits and the need for cultural sensitivity in research. Despite the challenges, the session inspired her to explore how AR principles could enhance her studies while honouring cultural diversity.

Similarly, Sonam Choki, another PgDE II A student, praised the webinar as an excellent demonstration of presenting AR effectively. She noted that AR is becoming more prevalent in Bhutan but found it challenging to fully understand due to difficulties with the audio and slides. Overall, the webinar provided valuable insights into how AR intersects with Bhutanese culture, offering lessons with broader significance for the global education and development sector.

Webinar on Teaching Geometric Reasoning

amtse College of Education (SCE) hosted a webinar on Teaching Geometric Reasoning on April 4th, 2024. The event was facilitated by Dr. Ruchi Kumar, Assistant Professor at the Centre for Excellence in Teacher Education of Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai, India, and moderated by Mr. Purna Bahadur Subba, Lecturer in Mathematics, Department of STEM Education.


The primary objective of the webinar was to enhance the professional capacity of mathematics teacher educators, pre-service teachers, and school teachers involved in teaching mathematics at secondary schools in Bhutan. It aimed to inform them of best practices in teaching mathematics and to inspire a sense of lifelong learning. This webinar was part of the ongoing CL4STEM Research Project, focusing on the implementation and impact of Mathematics Open Education Resources (OER) in Bhutanese schools, supported by funding from the International Development Research Centre (IDRC), Canada.

Attendees appreciated the relevant and impactful

content, particularly the introduction of engaging digital resources and real-world applications for teaching geometry. Teacher's Day 2024: Celebration of Joy and Gratitude



Retreat for Mindfulness Practice

rom 6th May, a five-day retreat was held for the students of Postgraduate Diploma in Contemplative Counseling Psychology (PgDCCP) programme. The retreat that aimed to impart mindfulness training was resourced by the three counseling faculty members.

During the retreat, the participants underwent a thorough mindfulness training. On the first day, students were introduced to the basics of meditation. On the second day, the participants focused on the four foundations: body, life, effort and mind. On the third day, the participants were introduced to functional silence followed by body scan meditation on the fourth day. On the final day, all the participants and the resource persons practised on the three marks of existence: impermanence, suffering and egolessness. Tshering Lham, a second year PgDCCP student, observed, "For me, it is difficult to accept that the things around me are impermanent. Even if it is a piece of shirt, when it becomes worn out I hesitate to throw it out because it is difficult to let go of things that are mine."

Through the retreat, most of the participants were able to gain new insight and experiences. Ms. Tshering Lham shared, "I came to know that

mindfulness awareness practice does not require a unique tool, we can start it where we want and be who we are." She confessed that the first two days of the retreat were difficult because it required lots of patience. She added, "We did meditation for a short duration but I felt like we meditated for hours. I felt stiffness in my back, my legs felt numb and I was not able to focus on my breath." Despite the discomfort, she said it was worth it. Feedback from most of the retreat participants were positive stating that it was a new learning experience. They shared that the retreat has impacted their life in positive ways and are determined to continue with the mindfulness practice throughout their life.


